It was in 1991, while investigating the evolutionary architectural changes at Thomas Jefferson's Poplar Forest retreat, that our speaker found the first of many rats' nests in the hollow walls and floors. Rats' nests have been useful for certain architectural restorations where they have provided clues for restored features or

furnishings by exploring a number of questions, such as: Why did the rats take certain things? Why did they arrange their nests the way they did? Are different parts of a nest used for different purposes? What was the use of other materials that seemingly had no practical function?

THE MEANING OF MARY MAGDALENE

Discovering the Woman at the Heart of Christianity

Mary Magdalene is one of the more influential symbols in the history of Christianity—yet, if you look in the Bible, you'll find only a handful of verses that speak of her. How did she become such a compelling saint in the face of such paltry evidence?

In her effort to answer that question, Cynthia Bourgeault examines the Bible, church tradition, art, legend, and newly discovered texts to see what's there. She then applies her own reasoning and intuition, informed by the wisdom of the ages-old Christian contemplative tradition. What emerges is a radical view of Mary Magdalene as Jesus of Nazareth's most important disciple, the one he considered to understand his teaching best. That teaching was characterized by a nondualistic approach to the world and by a deep understanding of the value of the feminine. Bourgeault shows how an understanding of Mary Magdalene can revitalize contemporary Christianity, how Christians and others can, through her, find their way to Jesus' original teachings and apply them to their modern lives.



Rachel Held Evans is widely recognized for her theologically astute, profoundly honest, and beautifully personal books, which have guided, instructed, edified, and shaped Christians as they seek to live out a just and loving faith.

At the time of her tragic death in 2019, Rachel was working on a new book about wholeheartedness. With the help of her close friend and author Jeff Chu, that work-in-progress has been woven together with some of her other unpublished writings into a rich collection of essays that ask candid questions about the stories we've been told—and the stories we tell—about our faith, our selves, and our world.

This book is for the doubter and the dreamer, the seeker and the sojourner, those who long for a sense of spiritual wholeness as well as those who have been hurt by the Church but can't seem to let go of the story of Jesus. Through theological reflection and personal recollection, Rachel wrestles with

God's grace and love, looks unsparingly at what the Church is and does, and explores universal human questions about becoming and belonging.



THE CHALLENGE OF JESUS


Thursdays, 11:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m., in the Parlor

This gospel speaks well to church communities today, identifying the Church as founded by Jesus (16:18) and issuing practical instructions for practicing community (18:1-35). The author envisions the Church as made up of sinners and doubters who struggle with faith, temptation, and forgiveness, but ultimately reflect the ministry and presence of Jesus the Christ.
