A MESSAGE FROM PARISH NURSE GAIL MIDKIFF: UPDATED COVID-19 BOOSTERS

The updated COVID-19 booster is now available. It is available at no charge for anyone aged 12 and over who has completed a primary COVID-19 series or had a booster at least two months ago. It is called "bivalent" because it targets both the original strain of the coronavirus and the two Omicron variants that are causing most current infections. As for timing, the bivalent booster should be given a minimum of two months after completion of the primary series or the last booster. For those who have been infected with the coronavirus, most experts recommend waiting until three months after the infection before getting the booster. It takes several weeks for the booster to take effect. The bivalent booster is available now at some local pharmacies. Check their websites for availability and to register for an appointment time. Call your primary care provider or the health department to determine if they have the bivalent booster. The booster is important because a surge of infections is expected during this coming fall and winter. COVID-19 continues to circulate widely and causes about 400 deaths daily in the U.S. Even mild infections can cause long COVID and the risk of developing long COVID increases with subsequent infections. Being vaccinated and boosted helps protect not only the individual, but also the community, because vaccination reduces community transmission. Being vaccinated and boosted does not prevent all COVID-19 infections, but greatly reduces the risk of getting infected and of having a serious infection.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Lutheran Disaster Response is working with the Caribbean Synod to support impacted areas of Puerto Rico in the aftermath of Hurricane Fiona. Some places on the island are still recovering from Hurricane Maria. While communities are more prepared than in 2017, significant relief and recovery is expected to be needed. Local pastors are waiting for water levels to recede to find out the extent of the damage to buildings. Anticipated immediate needs include clean water, food supplies, and other basic necessities. In addition to prayers, monetary gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response are used in full (100 percent) to assist those directly impacted, providing help and hope for those affected by this disaster. THE DIFFICULT WORDS OF JESUS

Jesus of Nazareth provided his disciples teachings for how to follow Torah, God's word; he told them parables to help them discern questions of ethics and of human nature; he offered them beatitudes for comfort and encouragement. But sometimes Jesus spoke words that followers then and now have found difficult. He instructs disciples to hate members of their own families (Luke 14:26), to act as if they were slaves (Matthew 20:27), and to sell their belongings and give to the poor (Luke 18:22). He restricts his mission (Matthew 10:6); he speaks of damnation (Matthew 8:12); he calls Jews the devil's children (John 8:44).

In The Difficult Words of Jesus, Amy-Jill Levine – a professor of New Testament who is Jewish – shows how these difficult teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how they have been understood over time, and how we might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY CAN HOUSE

All are reminded of the Can House, located in the courtyard just outside the Fellowship Hall, where *aluminum* cans may be recycled. Cans are redeemed for money that will be used to construct Habitat for Humanity homes. Please keep in mind the following:

Only aluminum cans are accepted. Generally, if the can requires a can opener or attracts a magnet, it is not aluminum. We are asked not to put plastic bottles, metal cans, and other non-aluminum recyclables in the bin since this requires additional sorting before the cans are transported for recycling. **We can no longer accept cat food tins so please do not place them in the Can House.**

Those depositing loose aluminum cans in the Can House are asked to drop them into one of the collection bins inside the house and not on the floor. Ideally, it is helpful to put the cans in a plastic bag before putting them in the collection bins; however, please place in a single bag - **do NOT combine bags of cans inside other bags.**
