ASH WEDNESDAY

The word “Lent” is from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning “springtime” and so is to be understood as the holy springtime of the soul, a time of preparation, planting, and growth. We enter the forty days of this penitential season on Ash Wednesday, on which the Imposition of Ashes is offered to all who desire to receive this sign of frailty, repentance, and renewal. The ashes are made from palms used in the previous year’s Passion Sunday palm procession. A cross is drawn with the ashes on the forehead of each penitent, with the words of God to Adam, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return."

Ashes are an extraordinarily rich symbol rooted in ancient custom and practice. Ashes, in a Jewish and Christian context, suggest judgment and God's condemnation of sin; frailty and our total dependence upon God for life; humiliation; and, repentance. We are reminded forcefully of the words of the committal in the burial liturgy, ". . . earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust," for one day those words will be said over us.

However, ashes also suggest cleansing and renewal. They were once used as a cleansing agent in the absence of soap; and, on Ash Wednesday, the ashes have sometimes been understood as a penitential substitute for water as a sign of Holy Baptism. Water both stifles and refreshes, drowns and makes alive; so, the ashes also tell of both death and renewal, as is indicated by the ancient custom of burning the fields in the spring to destroy the old and to prepare for the new.

LENTEN OFFERINGS

Our special Lenten offerings are used for the broader work of the Lutheran Church through the Virginia Synod. Among those served by these ministries are the sick, the aged, prisoners, families in trouble, college students, people with developmental challenges, inner-city youth, candidates for ministry, people in need of counseling, and many others. We, through our gifts, become the hands of the Christ through Caroline Furnace Lutheran Camp and Retreat Center, GraceInside Virginia Prison Ministry, enCircle (formerly Lutheran Family Services), Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Virginia Lutheran Homes, Roanoke College, and National Lutheran Communities and Services. We are proud of the broad mission outreach of our Church and are challenged to give it our generous support. Offerings should be placed in Lenten envelopes, or marked clearly as special Lenten gifts, or made through the online giving portal available on our website by selecting the Seasonal Special Offerings fund.
