Within the profound words of today's gospel reading lies the simple message that God's love is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. The Christ comes among us in the gathered worshiping congregation, the scriptures, the baptismal waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine of the Eucharist. We receive the fullness of God's grace and truth through these ordinary gifts.

WE GATHER AROUND THE WORD AND THE PRAYERS

First Lesson - Jeremiah 31:7-14

God promises to bring Israel back to its land from the most remote parts of exile. In Zion, Israel will rejoice over God's gifts of food and livestock. Young women will express their joy in dancing; God will give gladness instead of sorrow.

⁷Thus says the LORD: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O LORD, your people, the remnant of Israel." ⁸See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here. ⁹With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn. ¹⁰Hear the word of the LORD, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, "He who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd a flock." ¹¹For the LORD has ransomed Jacob, and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him. ¹²They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the LORD, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall become like a watered garden, and they shall never languish again. ¹³Then shall the young women rejoice in the dance, and the young men and the old shall be merry. I will turn their mourning into joy, I will comfort them, and give them gladness for sorrow. ¹⁴I will give the priests their fill of fatness, and my people shall be satisfied with my bounty, says the LORD.

The psalmist sings a hymn of praise to the Lord who has shown faithfulness to Jerusalem and God's people Israel.

Worship the LORD, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion; ¹⁴for he has strengthened the bars of your gates: he has blessed your children within you. ¹⁵He has established peace on your borders: he satisfies you with the finest wheat. ¹⁶He sends out his command to the earth, and his word runs very swiftly. ¹⁷He gives snow like wool; he scatters hoarfrost like ashes. ¹⁸He scatters his hail like bread crumbs. Who can stand against his cold? ¹⁹He sends forth his word and melts them; he blows with his wind, and the waters flow. ²⁰He declares his word to Jacob, his statutes and his judgments to Israel. ²¹He has not done so to any other nation; to them he has not revealed his judgments. Hallelujah!

Second Lesson - Ephesians 1:3–14

In Jesus the Christ, all of God's plans and purposes have been made known as heaven and earth are united. Through him, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. ⁵He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, ⁶to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight ⁹he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. ¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

Holy Gospel - John 1:1, 10-18

The author of the gospel according to John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

¹⁰He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵(John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me."") ¹⁶From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.



Sermon

A new beginning. The calendar has turned once more and a new year is here – and not a moment too soon from a variety of perspectives. After the difficulties and challenges of a year in which we were faced with the ongoing pandemic, a political insurrection and domestic terrorism, horrendous natural disasters, rampant gun violence, racial injustice, and more, we are soooooo ready for a new beginning. Moreover, on this second day of the new year, most New Year's resolutions – for those who make them – are probably still intact, creating for us at least the illusion of hope that the new year will be better than the old one.

But therein also lies the challenge. For while on this January 2nd our resolutions, expectations, and hopes are still intact, how will they be faring a week from now, or a month from now, or six months from now? There is a Mark Twain quote that speaks to this reality: "Now is the accepted time to make your annual good resolutions. Next week you can begin paving hell with them as usual." Most likely, many of our resolutions will be an afterthought in the coming weeks or months and, depending on the headlines, our hopes may be as well.

A new beginning is the audacious claim we hear in our gospel reading this morning from the gospel according to John. The author, a Jewish mystic, begins his story about Jesus of Nazareth by echoing the opening words of Genesis way back in the very first book of the Bible: "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth . . ." It is as if the gospel writer is composing a **NEW** Genesis, a **NEW** beginning – of history, of humanity, of God's involvement in the creation. His story about Jesus of Nazareth is structured from beginning to end not just to **TELL** us, but to **EVOKE** for us and in us the living, breathing promise of a **NEW** beginning for all of human history in and through the incarnate Word, Jesus the Christ.

With a nod to the seven days detailed in the first creation parable in Genesis, the gospel writer then goes on to tell of seven signs (what we often call miracles in the other Gospels). And then, the Johannine gospel writer culminates with the eighth sign: resurrection. The resurrection symbolizes an eighth day – the start of a new week, a new chapter, a new epoch. In addition, **ONLY** in the gospel according to John, does the resurrection happen in a **GARDEN**, stated very explicitly, also with a reference to a gardener – another reference back to Genesis and a literary flashback to the Garden of Eden so that we might see the resurrection as the **NEW** creation.

However, as we look into our lives and around our world, we may question whether or not we can really trust new beginnings. Fortunately, John's gospel gives us a promise worth trusting and worth our attention.

First, the gospel writer describes Jesus as God's Word, God's Logos – meaning God's logic, reason, or rationale. Just as words enable us to communicate, to share our thoughts and feelings with precision and clarity, to express ourselves to each other, and to be understandable and approachable, so does Jesus express the very mind, design, and purpose of God. Jesus is God's word and promise to us, God speaking as clearly as possible. God in Jesus, John's gospel makes clear, is doing something **NEW**. In earlier days, God gave the law and the prophets as expressions of God's will, but now God is going a step further, actually speaking to us directly and personally in a **NEW** way through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus the Christ.

At the time of the Reformation, Martin Luther and other reformers spoke of the "speaking God" – "Deus loquens" in Latin, "loquens" being the Latin root of our English word "eloquent." Therefore, the Word made flesh to dwell among us is God at God's most eloquent, speaking as clearly as possible of God's profound love for us.


Second, this new, tangible, enfleshed Word opens up the reality of a **NEW** relationship with God. We hear in today's gospel that "No one has ever seen God" – which is not really something of which we need to be reminded. After all, when tragedy strikes, when disappointment crushes us, when hope and happiness flee, we often wonder where God is and sense the seemingly palpable **ABSENCE** of God far more profoundly than perhaps we've ever experienced God's **PRESENCE**. An unknown and unseen God can easily be perceived as being capricious, untrustworthy, and ultimately fearsome.

This is one reason why Jesus our Lord – the Holy One nestled in the very bosom of God – comes as God's Word made flesh, to reveal to us God's parental love. He comes not just to **reveal**, but to **speak** through word and deed as eloquently as possible that there is **nothing** God won't do, nowhere God won't go, nothing God won't endure – even the death of God's own Son – so that we may know we are God's beloved children, made worthy of dignity, honor, and love.

This is the heart of today's audacious Gospel – that in Jesus the Christ we receive a love letter written in human flesh and blood from the God who, in the beginning, created the vast cosmos, who continues to sustain the universe even now, and who values each and every one of us more than we can possibly imagine. That Word creates all things **NEW**, taking our resolutions and hopes as well as our fears and disappointments, and binding them together in the promises of God – God the Divine One who created in the beginning and who **continues** to create again and again, even in this very place and time, in this new year. Amen
