

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

November 30, 2025

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: the Christ is coming! In today's readings, both Paul and Jesus of Nazareth challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's appearing. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: the Christ who comes among us this day in word and meal to strengthen our faith in the promises of God.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Lesson - Isaiah 2:1-5

The visionary message presented in this reading focuses on a future day when God establishes a universal reign of peace.

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

²In days to come

the mountain of the LORD's house

shall be established as the highest of the mountains,

and shall be raised above the hills;

all the nations shall stream to it.

³Many peoples shall come and say,

"Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD,

to the house of the God of Jacob;

that he may teach us his ways

and that we may walk in his paths."

For out of Zion shall go forth instruction.

and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem.

⁴He shall judge between the nations,

and shall arbitrate for many peoples;

they shall beat their swords into plowshares,

and their spears into pruning hooks;

nation shall not lift up sword against nation,

neither shall they learn war any more.

⁵O house of Jacob,

come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!

Psalm 122

(sung in unison)

This psalm is a pilgrim's song of praise and prayer for the peace of Jerusalem.

I was glad when they | said to me,*
"Let us go to the house | of the LORD."

3Jerusalem is built | as a city*
that is at unity | with itself;

4to which the tribes go up, the tribes of the LORD,*
the assembly of Israel, to praise the name of the LORD.

Second Lesson - Romans 13:11-14

Paul compares the advent of the Christ to the coming of dawn. We live our lives today in light of Christ's coming in the future.

¹¹Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹²the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. ¹⁴Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

L: The word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God.

Holy Gospel - Matthew 24:36-44

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the twenty-fourth chapter.



The gospel writer portrays the Lord's coming as a sudden, unexpected event to all caught up in the usual affairs of daily life. He urges people to be alert and expectant.



Jesus said to the disciples, ³⁶"About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, ³⁹and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴¹Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴²Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day

your Lord is coming. ⁴³But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁴Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour."



Apostles' Creed

- A: God of new possibilities, when addiction wounds, jealousy tears down, and relationships fray, show us how to journey with one another. Nurture therapists, counselors, and sponsors in their care for others. God of grace,
- C: hear our prayer.
- A: God of all time, build up our lives that we would reflect your grace. At the last, bring us with all the saints into your holy presence where peace and goodness make a home. God of grace,
- C: hear our prayer.
- P: Into your hands, O Lord, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.



Offertory Prayer and Consecration of Pledges


- A: Merciful Father,








Post-Communion Prayer for Advent


